






A Note from the governors

Governors were delighted recently to have news of impressive public examination results from iCollege learners of 2022. The range of qualifications in such a variety of subjects is testimony to the staff's continued attention to meeting the diverse needs and attributes of all iCollege's learners. Congratulations to both staff and learners for all their efforts, especially as these results were achieved against the continued presence of Covid and the constraints that this placed on all aspects of iCollege's work over a protracted period of time.

Another recent significant event for iCollege is the temporary move for staff and learners from Integration to Parsons Down Infants School, which had become vacant. This was a big move for all concerned at the Calcot site. Integration's previous home is being completely transformed with the iCollege new build underway there. Governors were also invited to a staff barbecue on the INSET day, which was a very good opportunity for staff and governors to meet informally.

'My life's a mess! Everything keeps changing! Look at what's happening in the world: there's a war, and this cost of living thing, and Covid keeps coming back!' I often hear these sort of laments from young people, voicing what we as adults might feel too. What they're grappling with is how chaos can engulf life, chaos both externally and internally: the multitude of things going on in the world over which humans have little control, coupled with the tumultuous experience of growing into a developing body and brain whilst working out who you are and what's expected of you.

Young people are always fascinated by chaos. Think about the course of modern music and art, zombie movies, and the themes of X-box games. There's a dynamism and vibrancy in chaos that's inventive, spontaneous, and, yes, destructive. With good reason we encourage young people to focus on what they can do to structure their lives and prepare for the future, but in doing so we might gloss over the intensely felt awareness that order is fragile, often boring, and potentially stifling. Yes, chaos can be frightening, but it can prompt us to reassess our world and remind us of our capacity for flexibility. In nature there is a continual kaleidoscopic flow, an organic order imbued with chaotic change that works towards adaptation for new circumstances. And of course we're part of nature, so we too have an inherent ability to adapt psychologically and physiologically to change; we're only still existing as a species because we can do so. The best context in which we can do this is within relationships: these are what contain chaos and help sustain us when things fall apart. And it is out of our relationships that all sorts of interesting and creative responses might emerge.

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In Conversation with Cheyanne

I'm Cheyanne and I'm a year 11 learner at Intervention. In this edition of the newsletter, I have interviewed Maureen Sims who is the Chairperson of our school governors.

My first question was to ask what her role at iCollege is.

She explained that her job is to challenge staff and governors, ask questions and make sure people can talk.

She said that there are 12 governors at the moment, with 2 spaces available. I asked her why she became a governor of iCollege, and she said it is a volunteer job and there aren't many governors because it's unpaid and takes up time. She felt that after being in education for so long, she wanted to "give back".

After this, I asked her if, now that she knows iCollege learners, there was anything she would change about how she dealt with mainstream. She said that mainstream schools tend to focus on groups and not individuals and that she can now see how important it is to be more flexible for learners who struggle to engage. She also said she would put more support in for teachers to help learners.

My next question was, "If you could change one thing for learners at iCollege, what would it be?"

She said, "A lot of small things add up to become big things." She mentioned further opportunities for young people to come to iCollege, proper science labs, more equipment and sports facilities as well as a minibus! I think a minibus and extra equipment would be good for iCollege. A minibus would help more people come to school and a proper science lab would be brilliant as we have the same rights as mainstream learners.

When I asked her what she thinks it means to be successful, she said it was about feeling that you are doing your best.

I asked her if she thought mainstream school was better than iCollege. She said, "Certainly not!" She thinks we're both important and that we could learn from each other. She said that mainstream schools should learn a thing from iCollege: to stick with learners.

Cheekily, I asked her if she had ever got into trouble when she was at school. She told me a story about her school uniform. It was purple and included a beret. She thought this beret was "ridiculous" and didn't want to wear it, so she stood on it in a puddle and got a detention from her french teacher!

Finally, I asked her what is at the top of her bucket list and she said that she would like to visit New York.
