# Message from Jacquie

This seems to have been a very short term at iCollege! Just 6 weeks from our return after Easter on 17<sup>th</sup> April to finishing for

the May/June half term on 26<sup>th</sup> May! Of course, we 'lost' 2 Mondays for the May Day Bank Holiday and the King's Coronation, so that just left us with 28 school days. If a learner missed just 3 days this term, that equates to 10% of the available learning time, and it that rate of absence was extrapolated over a whole academic year, it would mean 19 days, or nearly a whole month of learning time. So why is attendance important?

- Every moment in school counts, and days missed add up quickly.

- The higher a learner's attendance, the more they are likely to learn, and the better they are likely to perform in exams and formal assessments.

- Being around teachers and friends in a school environment is one of the best ways for children to learn and reach their potential.

- Time in school also keeps children safe and provides access to extra-curricular opportunities and pastoral care.

iCollege recognises it is not always easy for learners to get to school on time, or sometimes at all. We can often help out with practical issues like transport, and in some cases, breakfast and school equipment.

Most of all, we appreciate the importance of working together with learners and families in improving attendance and giving all learners the opportunities to achieve their potential, look after their own well-being and for us to support their wider development.

James gave the young people an extensive tour and told them how he hadn't known what he wanted to do after school. He went into construction and soon decided he wanted to be in charge! At 23, he has just finished his studies, paid for by Equans, and is in control of all activities on this busy construction site. He advised learners to get as many qualifications as they can in order to provide options.

out information about the candidates for the Thatcham West Ward. Once we decided who we liked, we visited our polling station, filled in the ballot paper and posted it into the ballot box. When the votes were counted, we found out that our school election results predicted the real-life outcome: victory for the Liberal Democrats, winning the most seats in West Berkshire Council.

In history, learners have been thinking about migration and exploring why people wanted to live in Britain and what resources were on offer. They have been researching the main groups that invaded Britain and considering what it might have been like to live in the Dark Ages.

In English, we have started a new project on William Shakespeare, looking at a variety of plays and have produced some amazing descriptive work on the Tempest about being caught in a storm.

Maths has seen us focusing on algebra, ratio and geometry. We have been solving problems involving missing values and working out percentages of large amounts.

Learners have been investigating light, shadows and hearing in science, conducting experiments on how a shadow changes as an object moves nearer to a light source. We have also been thinking about refraction in water and glass.

Sounds like a VERY busy and productive term!

Using chromatography, learners at Intervention have been solving the crime. They separated inks from some pens and discovered the guilty party...






#### Fun science with Reading Scientific Services Ltd at Intervention and Pod

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## Our iCollege Community

Sooner or later the topic comes up in my time with young people; 'my bedroom.' Young people understandably have all sorts of important feelings about their bedrooms. Referring to 'my room' means they're talking about the physical space and their internal world. Exploring bedrooms involves wondering about privacy, secrets, and trust. Counselling affords young people the chance to explore, perhaps for the first time, degrees of privacy: 'Do I want to share this personal thing about myself? Will my counsellor think I'm weird?' Whether I'm told stories about what's there, or whether I ask directly about things, everything is of equal interest to me. Opportunities to explore key life moments, transitions, and bittersweet experiences of growing up are scattered throughout their rooms. And of course there are sessions when a young person keenly tells me about redecorating their room. Woven through their details of new paint, furniture, and posters, is the palpable sense that 'I'm growing up. This is what I'm into now. I'm trying out a different way of being me. I'm not sure what to keep and what to throw away.' And implicit in their eagerly shared plans is the question 'And what do you think?' iCollege counsellor
