Our first news is that we welcomed two new members of staff to Pod Plus, Rebecca Reilly, who has taken over Jo Farley's class and Elle Stalker, who is our new teaching assistant. They have both settled in really well and the learners have taken to them already.

Although this has only been a relevantly short term the learners have packed a lot into it and in English have written descriptive stories linked to our adventure topic. They have also had the opportunity to be film critics, writing reviews on what the films were about as well as what they enjoyed about them and the type of people the films are aimed at.

In maths the learners have been focusing especially on adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing fractions with different denominators. They have also been looking at measuring angles as well as finding missing angles on a straight line and around a point.

In art, we have been linking the work to our topic work on erosion and the changing landscape. The learners have been completing designs on pebbles as well as creating fossil prints and creating sculptures of pebbles out of clay.





Starting with his wonderings about the death and destruction in Gaza and Ukraine and the possibility of World War III, Tom then bemoans how school and his parents keep reminding him to focus on his GCSEs, scorns the time he's spent in 'isolation' following disruptive behaviour, and rounds it all off with 'and we're all gonna die anyway.' He looks at me expectantly, as if to say, 'Right, Mr. Counsellor, what are you going to do about all that then, eh?'

The anxieties elicited by the givens of human existence (death, the freedom to make of our lives as we will, our ultimate aloneness, and the absence of a clear meaning to life) rear their heads in all sorts of ways in our conversations with young people. Tom's anxiety announces itself with Sartre's lovely phrase 'the vertigo of possibilities'. Each time we meet it feels as if he's telling me 'Part of me wants to have a go, and part of me can't be bothered; no one's the boss of me, and can't you just tell me what to do; oh, and anyway, A*s and good behaviour won't protect me from death.' Rendering intelligible these different takes on what it means to be alive, without offering false solutions, and sticking with him as he grapples with the existence pain we all face, gradually helps him to bear his anxiety and to understand that he's not getting anything wrong in finding it hard, and that it's not as personal as it feels. *iCollege counsellor*
