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Health and well-being

Every year we all accompany young people as they adopt various strategies to help them contend with the blunt realities confronting them in the form of exams. Every year I hear things like: 'I'm not ready yet!'; 'I should be panicking more, shouldn't I?'; 'It doesn't feel real that they're starting now!'; 'I'm not bothered'; 'I reckon exams are all about the government trying to control us'; 'I'll just get on with it, what's the big deal?'

These statements are imbued with feelings we all recognise and have felt at some point. How to respond to the challenges life throws at us. Jump in and have a go? Give up? Wobble and hope to be rescued? Scornfully defy? Be sanguine and adapt? And how we respond is informed by what we feel is expected of us by our families, friends, teachers, and ourselves. None of this is simple.

And every year, no matter the outcome, these realities are opportunities for young people to learn about themselves and how the world works. They might learn about actions having consequences (put in the work and you're more likely to do well, but it's not guaranteed), or that when it comes down to it no one can do it for you, or that as personal as it might feel, life moves on for all of us. Supporting them by drawing on our own experiences, recognising that the future can be scary, we can remind them that what they're feeling makes absolute sense, stand with them as they take a deep breath, and encourage them to have a go

In conversation with Cheyanne

I'm a year 10 learner at Intervention, and I spoke with our school caretaker Barry to try and understand more about his role and what he does to help our school run smoothly. Barry has been here for 4 and a half years. He explained that he has been here "since it changed over from Reintegration to iCollege". Most people who are 72 would be retired but Barry loves his job and says that he doesn't "do it for the money, he does it for the gratitude that he receives from staff and learners."



Barry told me that as part of his job he has to fix windows, complete plumbing repairs, replace fixtures and fittings and redecorate the classrooms in the holidays. It sounds like an exciting job and it obviously suits Barry's personality as he describes how he loves "working with his hands." He told me that he spent many years working in Health and Safety where he had to use his brain but he always preferred the building trade. The reason he loves working at iCollege is because he gets to use all of his experience across different jobs.

Working across all 5 iCollege sites can involve Barry travelling around 40-50 miles each day. He joked that the hardest part of his job is getting up in the morning!

Barry told me that he is an old rock n roller with his favourite band being ELO – Electric Light Orchestra. He used to love dancing to Northern Soul at the old air force base at Greenham. I really enjoyed talking with Barry as he was so friendly and funny; he is a truly caring caretaker.

A Note from Governors

Now it's suddenly summer! Or so it would seem... For the most part, issues with Covid seem to be moving away but it would be wrong to be overly complacent. That said, hopefully, this will create more opportunities for governors to be involved in face to face meetings at iCollege and to make visits to the different units in person. Governors had the opportunity, on one of the two days, to meet up with the Lead Inspector to answer some of their questions and to present our thoughts on iCollege.

Another busy term before a short break at the end of this month. The exam season is already starting and all the complexities of the arrangements for these are being put in place. We wish the very best to all learners involved in exams and assessments in 2022.



June sees the culmination of this year's work towards the Duke of Edinburgh Awards with a number of Independence learners undertaking both the Bronze and Silver expeditions with Outdoor Academy.

They will first have to complete their practice expedition on the $16/17^{\text{th}}$ and then the actual expeditions will take place on the $21-22^{\text{nd}}$ June for bronze, and $21-23^{\text{rd}}$ June for silver. Participants will be working in teams in open canoes to complete a route in 2-3 days, and taking part in a cook-out amongst other challenges.
