# Important Covid information – return to school

From January 5<sup>th</sup> 2022, in line with Government guidance, as an 'alternative setting', iCollege will be planning for 'face-to-face- provision for all learners; there is no staggered or phased return. Your child's lead teacher will be in touch to confirm timetables on January 4<sup>th</sup>, 2022 when staff return to work after the holiday.

Onsite testing will take place for all learners on the first day that your child returns to an iCollege site following the Christmas break.

If the first day back is an 'off-site' day, for example, Auto Skills, Upper Lodge Farm, Work Experience or Outdoor Academy etc. when your child goes directly to the provision, please ensure that a home LFT is carried out and the results shared with the appropriate Lead Teacher. Learners with positive results should not attend iCollege or any planned provision.

As iCollege will be closed over Christmas, all staff and learners should test over the holidays in line with national guidance. This means that you should test if you will be in a high-risk situation that day, and before visiting people who are at higher risk of severe illness if they get COVID-19.

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# Curriculum news and information

### **GCSE Examination Information**

Ofqual (the national organisation responsible for examinations) made some significant announcements on 11/11/21 about the summer exams for 2022.

Ofqual confirmed that it is 'fully' committed to exams going ahead and feels that it is 'unlikely' that they will have to be cancelled.

# iCollege GCSE exams will begin the week of 16<sup>th</sup> May and finish the week of 13<sup>th</sup> June 2022.

# Is there a possibility that the exams might be cancelled? What will happen if this is the case?

Ofqual have stated that there needs to be a contingency plan and this plan will work in a similar way to last academic year: learners will be awarded Teacher Assessed Grades (TAGs.)

Schools are now being asked to assemble evidence of their learners' achievements in each subject. iCollege will be doing this by asking learners to complete GCSE practice questions and parts of past papers under exam conditions and also completing a **Practice Exam Week which will begin on 7<sup>th</sup> March 2022.** If the GCSE examinations are cancelled, iCollege will be setting 'in-college assessments' (ICAs) in the summer term.

We appreciate that news of assessments and GCSEs can be a little daunting but the best way to approach the forthcoming months is to take each week at a time and to attend lessons. Our iCollege teachers will support and guide their learners step by step through the process their lessons will equip them with the knowledge and skills they need.

This information is from guidance published on 11/11/21. Further changes will be communicated to you as and when they are made.

# In Conversation with Cheyanne

I'm Cheyanne, a year 10 learner at Intervention, and I'm going to be interviewing various people that work with us here at iCollege. The first person I am interviewing is Dave Hopper who runs outdoor academy (OA).



#### Cheyanne: So what is OA?

Dave: We started OA 15 years ago and we now work with a range of alternative schools. We give learners the chance to take part in wilderness activities, team challenges and outdoor pursuits such as kayaking, rock climbing and mountain boarding.

#### Cheyanne: How does OA help young people?

Dave: We provide them with fantastic opportunities and challenges. Every OA session encourages personal development, social interaction and equips learners with skills and qualifications which will help them to get jobs in the future.

#### Cheyanne: What are your goals for OA in the future?

Dave: Great question! We are hoping to move the base of our operation closer to Newbury which will help us improve what we can offer learners at iCollege. We consider ourselves an extension of the staff team at iCollege and we are really lucky to spend time working with such amazing young people.

Cheyanne: Finally, can you give us an interesting fact? Dave: Coconuts are ten times more dangerous than sharks.



Joni from **COINS** visited Intervention learners on 2<sup>nd</sup> December and delivered a great session on world views, awareness, acceptance and action.

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# Our iCollege community

'Um, I dunno whether you can give me a diagnosis, but I think I need one coz there's something wrong with me. Maybe I'm bipolar or something. I think my cousin's got it, so maybe I have too?'

'I've got anxiety. I keep having panic attacks. What's wrong with me?' 'I've got anger management. They tell me I need to sort it out.'

Here we are at the end of another year, one in which I continue to hear these sort of organising statements in my work with young people. They've learnt these narratives of distress through the culture in which they've grown up, which has sensitized us all to become suspicious of understandable emotional responses to the challenges of life and to see in them signs of illness. This is a trap in which it's very easy to become stuck. What these young people haven't paused to ask themselves, because no one's asked them, is not 'What's wrong with me?', but rather, 'What's happened to me?' And following on from this, the questions of 'How did it affect me?', 'What sense did I make of it?', and 'What did I have to do to survive?' Considered this way, their struggling to keep apace with life makes sense. Big, difficult feelings arise out of our encounters with a confusing, demanding world. Diagnoses and labels locate the causes of distress within the individual (and perhaps within the brain!), and remove meaning, as well as the need to explore each individual's experiences. We need to ask young people these questions (which come from the Power Threat Meaning Framework), followed by 'What are your strengths?', and then, to integrate it all, 'What's your story?' Helping young people tell their life story, with all of its ups and downs, helps them to make sense of their lives and find a way forward. Here's to a new year and a more hopeful way ahead. iCollege counsellor

### Who are we?

No matter which school you are coming from, or what your reasons are for needing time with us away from mainstream, Integration is usually the first stop for secondary learners who are referred to iCollege. We support learners needing some in-reach support here at the school away from mainstream, learners who have been excluded (both fixed term or permanently and awaiting new placement), or learners who need somewhere to continue their learning whilst awaiting a new school placement for various other reasons.

#### What can we offer?

Although young people can't stay with us on a permanent basis, we definitely look after you whilst you are with us (and often afterwards too!). The culture we promote is very much one of respect, support, and progress – not necessarily always focused on only education, but also progress for you as a person and what you want to do next in life. Education is a stepping stone to what comes next, and whatever you want to do (or even if you need



help figuring that out!), we are here to help set you up as best as possible on that journey.

We have two main learning groups here at Integration – the morning group, and a smaller afternoon group. Once you have joined us for your initial meeting with Fram (our Lead Teacher), a space will be allocated for you in one of those groups, based on what would work best for you. The curriculum itself is not too different, but we do have a heavier emphasis on regular physical activity breaks to help you maintain focus throughout the day, also providing you an opportunity to sit down and chat with our lovely team about anything that may be on your mind, or even just to try and beat our reigning Uno champion!
